<u>Creator of Material Biography</u>: Sr. Jane Marie Richardson, SL, was born as Mary Jane on June 2, 1928 in Louisville, Kentucky to Roy Clinton Richardson and Elsie Margaret Kippes Richardson. She grew up attending Catholic schools in Louisville and entered the Novitiate immediately after high school, receiving the habit and the religious name Jane Marie on April 25, 1947. Having studied piano and voice during her youth, Jane Marie's first assignments were teaching music at grade schools in Denver and St. Louis. She received her bachelor's in music education from Webster College (now Webster University) in Webster Groves, Missouri in 1956. Subsequently, she returned to Louisville to teach at her alma mater, Loretto High School, before earning her master's in musicology from Eastman College in Rochester, New York. She served for a year as Assistant Mistress of Postulants at the Motherhouse before heading to Europe for three years of study, first at the Pontifical Institute Regina Mundi in Rome and later at the Istitut *Catholique* in Paris. Upon her return, she spent a year as Mistress of Postulants before being elected to the General Council in 1964. Jane Marie served as Mother Mary Luke Tobin's assistant and accompanied her to Rome during the Second Vatican Council (Vatican II). In response to Vatican II, the Sisters of Loretto adopted a new constitution called *I Am the Way* in 1969, which Jane Marie played a key role in developing. In 1970, Jane Marie began to live a contemplative life in a cabin on the grounds of the Motherhouse. Six years later, she founded and became director of Cedars of Peace, a retreat center made up of several simple cabins where people can stay to enjoy solitude and reflection. Her quiet lifestyle encompassed a great concern for the suffering of others. She participated in protests against the School of the Americas in Ft. Benning, Georgia, and in 1984, traveled to El Salvador to support the families of the disappeared and to reflect on the tragedy of the brutal rape and murder of four U.S. missionaries four vears earlier. In 1990, she left Cedars to move to Louisville to care for a Loretto Co-Member with Alzheimer's disease. Jane Marie staved in Louisville until 2014, serving on the Loretto staff as a resource person for spirituality, a role in which she offered spiritual direction, wrote articles, and did retreat work. Beginning in 1970 (prompted by the celebration of Tobin's 12 years as superior general), she began writing music, mostly for meditation and liturgical use. She continued to compose music throughout the rest of her life, eventually writing about 150 songs total. She recorded a CD of her music in 2003, entitled Sing With Your Life. Jane Marie died on March 10, 2014 at the Loretto Motherhouse Infirmary.

<u>Description</u>: Materials created by, collected by, or about Jane Marie Richardson. Materials in this series have been divided into five sub-series: writings, musical compositions, photographs, correspondence,

and Merton Materials. Jane Marie gave a number of talks and speeches throughout her time as a Sister and this is reflected in the writings sub-series which contains speech transcripts and notes. Her writing encompasses many topics including contemplative life, women religious, inclusive language, and mysticism. Her calendars and journals can be found in this sub-series as well. The musical compositions sub-series contains songbooks, sheet music, and audio for many of the nearly 150 musical pieces she wrote in her lifetime. Audio formats include cassettes, compacts discs, and master reels. Many, but not all, of the audio materials have been digitized. The photograph sub-series scans the entirety of Jane Marie's life but predominately focuses around Jane Marie's life and work as a Sister of Loretto. Correspondence consists primarily of correspondence to and from Mary Schaldenbrand, a Loretto co-member and close confidant to Jane Marie. Letters both to Mary and to Jane Marie's family provide detailed accounts of Jane Marie's time in Europe. The final sub-series of the collection is comprised of Jane Marie's research into and work on Thomas Merton. Jane Marie was a Merton scholar and a member of the International Thomas Merton Society.
