<u>Creator of Material Biography</u>: Sr. Penny McMullen, S.L (1942-2017) was born Sylvia Penelope McMullen in Minneapolis, Minnesota. She attended high school at Newman High School in Sterling, IL and applied for permission to join vowed life shortly after graduating. She received the habit on May 31, 1961 and took the name John Elizabeth. Penny earned her B.A. in Mathematics from Webster University and an M.A. in Mathematics from Bowdoin University. At Webster College she studied with the originators of the Madison Project, a "new math" curriculum program. Penny taught at several Loretto schools between 1963 and 1972. In 1974, Penny began community organizing work for the National Farm Worker Ministry in St. Louis. She spent a year in Chile as a volunteer for the Chilean Refugee Program-Partners in Mission. Penny also spent time as a paralegal and an adult educator.

Penny moved to Santa Fe, NM in the mid-1980s and remained there for most of the rest of her life. While in Santa Fe, Penny worked as a teacher, an advocate for farm workers, and as a nuclear-free world activist. Around age 50, Penny began to suspect that she had high-functioning autism. She was tested and diagnosed with autism, and then began a master's program at Skidmore College where she studied the effects of high-functioning autism on afflicted adults. She began the Loretto Tutor Team in Santa Fe, which grew to have 20 tutors serving about 200 students annually. Penny also lobbied the New Mexico state government to support awareness of and services for people with autism.

<u>Description</u>: Consists of two sub-series. The first sub-series documents Penny's pursuit of her M.A.L.S from Skidmore College and her written work which resulted from that degree program. Contained in these materials are Penny's research into autism and essays relating her own experience as a person with autism, including extensive writing of her symptoms and diagnosis. Also included in this sub-series are correspondence with Skidmore College and photographs of Penny's graduation. The second sub-series documents the Loretto Tutor Team.
